Chips Quinn Scholars Program for Diversity in Journalism

The Chips Quinn Scholars Program offers training, paid internships and cash awards to college students or recent graduates who are pursuing careers in journalism. College juniors, seniors or graduates within the past year with majors or career goals in journalism are eligible.

Campus newspaper experience is strongly encouraged.

The program begins with a 10-day orientation/multimedia training program (in Nashville, Tenn.) followed by a 10- or 12-week paid internship at a participating newspaper.

Nominees must be U.S. citizens or permanent U.S. residents.

Internships are full-time. Students who have not yet graduated and are applying for the Spring program must plan to take the semester off from school.

Students nominated **must** have a car.

Final placements are based on editors' selections and newspapers' needs.

Please inform us of any family or other obligations that would impose geographic limitations on your internship.

Students can apply directly by submitting this form and other required documents.

Please check to be sure you have included:

1. The completed and signed application form
2. A résumé
3. Academic transcripts (unofficial acceptable)
4. At least two letters of recommendation from persons who know your journalism skills.

Recommendation letters may be sent under separate cover. (i.e., journalism professor, campus newspaper adviser, supervisor from a previous internship or an editor for whose publication you have free-lanced)

5. Samples of your work

♦**REPORTERS:** Clear photocopies of **six** published articles on 8 ½" by 11" single-sided paper. Do not copy stories on both sides of the paper and do not reduce size of print. If stories are oversized, use 8 ½" by 14" paper or send a tearsheet. Class assignments are accepted but must be typed and double-spaced. Do not use folders or binders in submitting your package.

♦**PHOTOGRAPHERS:** Submit 10-20 photographs on a CD, with images saved as jpgs at 150dpi. Include a separate caption sheet on the cd. If not available, submit clear photocopies with caption information. Do not put images into any viewing program (i.e., quickshow, html, quicktime, etc.).
